Do you think that it makes the delicious stew more delicious?

What is Greed?

Perhaps it's keeping everything for yourself and not sharing with others?

Some people also think it's denying other people the things you have and that you want.

If you don't wish to be greedy, can you be prepared to give?



Generosity

Giving might include giving to charity—for example giving money to some charities can help poor people in other countries— people who, for example, have had their lives badly affected by natural disasters and wars. That would certainly be generous, to help people by giving your own money, your allowance for example.

But there are other ways of being generous, of giving too. Most would agree that it's a very good thing to be able to give to give. There are many things that you can give which won't cost you a penny, which would be very much appreciated.

One way is being generous with your time; by helping your parents for example, at home—maybe doing a household chore (without complaining!)

Another thought— what about being generous with your friend at school by listening carefully to what they have to say, perhaps smiling and laughing with them?

How do you think that would make them feel about you?

....By being generous of spirit by not complaining about people you might find annoying (perhaps someone in your family— maybe a brother or sister) - is that too difficult?

....By being generous with your attention?

....By being supportive and helpful to a classmate who is stuck with some work that you know how to do? They might help the other way round at some point.

These are all good things to do and these positive sorts of actions give us a strong sense of satisfaction.



The Benefits of Being a Good Person

When people act in an agreeable way, they feel good about themselves—and rightly so. They feel that they are decent, kind people and are trying their best. That creates a strong, warm sense of satisfaction from within and that feeling lasts a long time.

It's great when we have a little money, isn't it, and we can go and buy ourselves a tasty treat like some sweets or something like that. But that feeling doesn't last long. You eat the sweet, you feel good about the sweet, it's gone - the moment passes.

Most people recognize that when we are charitable and generous with our time and our efforts, that good feeling defends us against people who are mean-spirited and people who are hurtful towards us. They want to persuade us that we're not good people. But those acts of charity and self-giving defend us against that. They give us a long serving sense of doing the right thing.



Heaven and Hell

How does that make you feel about them?


I bet you feel in a very positive way about that person, don't you?
